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Preparing for Fall and Winter Amidst COVID-19

As the weather begins to change and health care professionals begin to embrace the influenza season amidst COVID-19, providers must start initiating conversations with their clients/patients on the importance of preparing for what could be an excruciating fall and winter. Although people with HIV who have developed COVID-19 have had an excellent prognosis, the Office of AIDS Research (2020) emphasizes that research on the development of COVID-19 continues to evolve; thus, all persons with HIV must be warranted. As you begin planning for what could be a busy fall and winter, below are five topics of discussion to have with your clients/patients the next time you meet (*please refer to the sources below for additional topics to consider*):

Vaccination: Is the individual's influenza and pneumococcal vaccinations up to date? If not, schedule a medical visit as soon as possible. According to the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention, getting the flu vaccine amidst COVID-19 is *exceptionally* critical for people living with HIV during the cold and flu season (CA Department of Public Health, 2020; The HIV Treatment of Journal of TPAN, 2020)

Antiretroviral therapy: The Interim Guidance for COVID-19 and Persons with HIV (Office of AIDS Research, 2020) recommends persons with HIV to maintain on-hand at least a 30-day supply, but **ideally** a 90-day supply

<u>Avoid exposure</u>: Encourage the individual to have a conversation with his/her/their pharmacists and/or health care providers regarding mail-order delivery of medications, along with telephone or virtual visits for routine and/or non-urgent care (Office of AIDS Research, 2020)

<u>Mental health</u>: The pandemic, coupled with winter isolation, may cause an increase in symptoms in patients with anxiety and depression. It is essential health care providers develop routine communication to lessen individuals with preexisting problems such as substance use disorder and depression (Office of AIDS Research, 2020; The HIV Treatment of Journal of TPAN, 2020)

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Substance treatment: social distance and isolation during the winter may exacerbate substance use issues. Providers should develop a plan to remain in communication to assess and address these issues, providing consultations and treatment (Office of AIDS Research, 2020)

World AIDS Day began in 1988 and takes place every year on December 1st. Not only is it an opportunity to commemorate those who have died from an AIDS-related ill-ness, but it's an opportunity to show your support for people living with HIV.

A simple red ribbon is one of the most widely recognized symbols of HIV and AIDS and the people who live with these conditions. The symbol was presented by the Visual AIDS Artists Caucus in 1991. The individuals in this group wished to remain anonymous, keep the image copyright free and create a symbol to raise consciousness of HIV and AIDS. The red ribbon was originally intended to be worn as a badge, but is now used in a wide variety of ways.1
