Who Was Ryan White

Ryan White was a boy born with severe hemophilia in 1971. In 1984, at the age of 13, Ryan was diagnosed with AIDS from a tainted batch of Factor 8, which was then, a new 'miracle' treatment for hemophilia. In 1985, Ryan had to fight for his right to attend school after being denied admission to Western Middle School in Kokomo, Indiana. Parents of school children signed a petition threatening a civil suite if Ryan was allowed to enter school. 50 teachers voted to keep him out of school. When classes began at Western Middle School, Ryan was linked by telephone hookup. Appeals were made by both sides, and a home school was even established by parents who didn't want their children to attend school with Ryan. The family relocated in 1987. Ryan began his freshman year of high school in 1987 without protest.

His fight gained international attention and support from professional athletes and actors from Hollywood. He appeared on the Today Show, CBS Morning News, Good Morning American, The Tonight Show, ABC's Nightline, CNN, Phil Donahue show, The Home Show with Howie Long, and Prime Time Live, as well as on the covers of USA Today, USA Weekend, People magazine, and LIFE Magazine. In 1989, ABC aired the Ryan White Story which celebrated the young man's short life as he fought for his rights to attend school.

Ryan died on Sunday, April 8, 1990, at the age of 18. Several months later, Congress passed the AIDS bill that bears his name—the Ryan White CARE (Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency) Act. The legislation has been reauthorized four times since, in 1996, 2000, 2006 and 2009. It is now known as the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program.

What is the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program and the HIV Health Services Planning Council

The Ryan White Program works with cities, states and local community-based organization to provide HIV-related services to People Living with HIV/AIDS. The program fills the service gaps for those who do not have sufficient health care coverage or financial resources to get treatment for their HIV disease. The majority of Ryan White funds support primary medical care and essential support services to areas that are most severely affected by HIV/AIDS. The legislation created a number of programs, called Parts, to meet needs for different communities and populations affected by HIV/AIDS.

The Counties of Sacramento, El Dorado, Placer, Yolo and Alpine receive funding which is managed by the County of Sacramento's Department of Health and Human Services. The Sacramento HIV Health

Services Planning Council conducts planning, decides how to use funds, and works to ensure a system of Care effectively services all eligibility People Living with HIV/AIDS in the region. Members of the Sacramento HIV Health Services Planning Council (HHSPC), appointed by the County of Sacramento's Board of Supervisors, consist of volunteers from community-based organizations, health care professionals, consumers, and those affected by HIV/AIDS. One-third of the planning council must be People Living with HIV/AIDS who receive services and are not affiliated with an agency, meaning that they are not staff, consultants or Board members of a funded agency.

Ryan White and Reauthorization

Reauthorization is a date imposed by Congress to review a program to make sure it is working as intended. On the date of reauthorizations, laws can either "sunset" (automatically cease to operate) or continued to operate with no change. Ryan White WILL NOT 'sunset' in September 2013. It will continue to operate without change.

The Obama Administration has indicated that they will not seek or push a reauthorization in 2013, as many Congressional leaders believes it is best to allow time to understand implications of the Affordable Care Act and how it intersects with the Ryan White populations, programs and services.

This means that programs will continue to operate in their existing state until new legislation is enacted. Members of Congress need to be educated about community process for visioning the future of Ryan White. There are approximately 108 new Members of the House since the last reauthorization in 2009.

Health reform from the Affordable Care Act (ACA) will not be fully functioning nor will its impacts on existing programs be fully recognized for quite some time. As such, gaps will not be immediately visible as not all populations or services currently provided through Ryan White will be covered. There will be a need to provide care to those unable to access health insurance as well as "wrap-around" services to cover high costs of insurance.

It is unknown how benefits provided through ACA will compare to services provided through Ryan White. Transition for clients and provides is huge and will take a substantial amount of time.

How Far Have You Come? Submitted by Debra

I don't know how long you've been in this race for life, but I've been HIV+ for 25 years and in treatment for about 17 of those 25. So many things kept me out of care including shame, fear, and acceptance; but in those 17 years I've taken every class, group, and/or training there is and in learning I had to get an understanding of how what I learned was changing me and my health got better. I learned how to read lab results; I could talk to someone besides myself when I had a problem or thought I did when I felt weak. There is always some sort of group or class teaching me how to do L.I.F.E. (Learning Immune Function Enhancement). After teaching me LIFE, they gave me H.O.P.E. (Healing One Positive Energy) to make sure I got it, they made it C.L.E.A.R. (Choosing Life: Empowerment, Action, Results!) and told me to always have hope. I have to K.I.S.S. (Keep It Simple Stupid) and if I ever wasn't C.L.E.A.R. about something in L.I.F.E. or felt I was losing hope. If I start to forget that A.O.D. (Alcohol or Drugs) is when my life gets out of control, I can always go learn 1 to 12. All I have to do is count them everyday, just one day at a time. So that's how far I have come. I do LIFE, keep HOPE alive and CLEAR in my heart and mind.
