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### Ending the HIV Epidemic: PrEP and PEP

Preventing the spread of HIV is a significant component of the federal Ending the HIV Epidemic in the U.S. (EHE) initiative. The EHE initiative includes a goal of a 90% decrease in the number of new HIV infections in the U.S. by 2030. The four key strategies to achieve this bold EHE initiative are to:

- 1. Diagnose all people with HIV as early as possible after infection.
- 2. Provide treatment to people with HIV rapidly and effectively to reach sustained viral suppression.
- 3. Prevent new HIV transmission by using interventions such as PrEP (pre-exposure prophylaxis), PEP (post-exposure prophylaxis), and syringe services programs.
- 4. Quickly respond to potential HIV outbreaks.

The HIV epidemic impacts each community differently, geographically, and demographically. Therefore, community members must be involved in the local EHE initiative to expand HIV prevention such as PrEP and PEP into all communities, especially in marginalized and underserved populations.

A significant effort to end the HIV epidemic is to prevent HIV by increasing access to PrEP and PEP. PrEP is a medication taken before HIV exposure to prevent infection. PrEP can be taken as an injection, which is given every two months, or a pill, taken either daily for ongoing risk or "on-demand" for intermittent risk. When using an "on-demand" schedule, also known as 2-1-1 PrEP, a person should take two pills 2-24 hours before sex, one pill 24 hours after the first dose, and one more pill 24 hours after the second dose. PEP is a medication taken after HIV exposure to prevent infection. It should be started as soon as possible after exposure and must be taken within 72 hours of exposure. PEP is taken daily for 28 days. Through intense outreach and education, and expanded and improved access to PrEP and PEP, treatment as prevention are the interventions to ending the HIV epidemic.

### Interested in Public Health Research

Based in San Francisco, SHARP (Summer HIV/AIDS Research Program) is a 12-week paid summer mentored internship and learning experience designed for students from underrepresented communities to pursue further studies and careers in public health-oriented clinical, socio-behavioral, and community-focused research.

All candidates must be legally eligible to work in the U.S. and be currently enrolled in an accredited institution (such as an university or a community college) as an undergraduate or have graduated within the last 2 years (no earlier than 2020 graduation date). Those already enrolled in a graduate program are not eligible.

Individuals from communities typically underrepresented in the field of research are strongly encouraged to apply (African Americans, Latinx, persons of indigenous descent, persons with disabilities, persons from disadvantaged backgrounds, and individuals who identify as transgender, lesbian, gay, or bisexual).

Ideal candidates are interested in conducting research that addresses health disparities as part of their career, interested in HIV and populations at risk, and connected to the community they want to conduct research with.
