National Women and Girls HIV/AIDS Awareness Day

March was National Women and Girls HIV/AIDS Awareness Day and we, the Sacramento Sisters in Survival, were invited to do an art show/presentation for a couple of classes at American River College. Mitch, an honorary SISTER and our "computer guy" organized the event for us. He got very ill, was admitted into the hospital and since he was in ICU, he had no way of communicating the details to us. (He is home now and doing much better.) So we were walking into the event blind.

But we, being the strong women that we are, got the furniture rearranged, put the easels together, set up our book table, strategically placed art around the room, and put condoms on all the tables with 3 minutes to spare. Our artists included a mother, a granddaughter, and a husband of women living with HIV. Of course, we also had HIV+ female artists. The types of art varied from acrylic paintings, knitting, colored pencils, collages to painted tins. Our most prominent work was a piece call "Y ME" by Joseph Rosenblatt who passed away on February 12th of this year. That particular piece was in the 1st edition of our book, MOSAIC,. The piece has since been donated to the SISTERS.

Reggie, Sacramento Sisters in Survival (SSIS) Co-Chair, started the presentation by reading SSIS's Mission Statement and a brief explanation of how our book came into existence. She then read a few excerpts from her chapter of the book. She focused on how hard it was being an HIV+ woman dealing with burying the man that gave her the virus that forever changed her life and the alienation of her family. I provided a brief explanation as to how Sacramento Sisters in Survival came into existence. Next I spoke about each piece of art and a little bit about the artists. Then, I too, read some excerpts from my chapter. I focused on being an HIV infected mother and the mother of an AIDS infected daughter.

Next was Victoria's turn to speak. Although she does not have a chapter in the 1st edition, she is currently working on her story which will be in our 2nd edition, due out in March 2015. Victoria focused on the stigmas she has dealt with for over 20 years and how AIDS has affected 3 generations of her family. She is the caregiver of her grandchildren and her mother. Last but not least was my wonderful husband, Floyd. He is usually our "move it" guy and was not prepared to speak about being part of the HIV community but spoke from the heart about how much it hurts when a friend dies. Taking care of his new wife and watching her deal with the stigmas on a daily basis.

After the presentation, we had a Question and Answer session. There was laughter, tears and hugs. I feel that students and teachers alike walked away with a better knowledge of what it is like living with the HIV virus. We have been vented back for next year's National Women and Girls HIV/AIDS Awareness Day. Two student asked if we could present to one of their classes.

I would like to thank Professor Hockerson's Diverse Populations and the Physical Anthropology class for attending.

I would also like to thank Fran for hosting the presentation at Sacramento State University. Fran is one of our founding members and the force behind the book. She had a dream and with months of blood sweat and tears, she and our editor, Diana Wyman, produced our wonderful book (which is now available on Kindle for \$3.99).



Sacramento Sisters in Survival is planning to print a second edition of our book: Mosaic: Sisters in Survival Your story is important to us and we would like to include it in our next edition.

KNOW SOMEONE IN CRISIS?

The TLCS Mental Health Crisis Respite Center (CRC) is staffed 24/7 and serves "any individual" in Sacramento County who is at least 18 years of age experiencing a mental health crisis but is not in immediate danger to self or others.

There is no medical staff at the Crisis Respite Center and participation is completely voluntary.

All individuals utilizing the Crisis Respite Center may be eligible to stay for up to 23 hours and expect service based in compassion, understanding and knowledge.

While at the Crisis Respite Center, the primary goal is to offer a stable and supportive environment so that the "guest" is better positioned to explore their crisis with a solution oriented mindset. Every guest will leave with an individualized resource plan. I

f transportation to the CRC is an issue, the CRC staff may be able to help.
